
2020 has flown by so quickly. This year was very interesting and unique in its own way. We have overcome so many obstacles in the past few months that we never would have expected and learned many new things.

"Please rise to welcome the graduating class of 2019!"



The first location was the oyster breeding area. They raised oysters at different stages of life in separate trays. We were allowed to hold the shellfish, and take pictures. Many of us were particularly enraptured by a little seahorse in a small tank.

At the next station were huge blue containers, filled to the brim with seawater. They held a delicacy known as sea grapes (*Caulerpa lentillifera*). The seaweed looked like glimmering little emerald beads intertwined onto a short

stem, like grapes. It tasted distinct, like nothing I have tasted before; it had the right amount of saltiness to make your mouth water and wanting more. Before we moved on, a peculiar creature caught everyone's attention; it had smooth fair skin, and was shaped like a short tentacle. Many stood with a puzzled look on their face. They watched as one of the researchers reached their hand into the container to pull out the mysterious aquatic creature. Lo and behold, it was a sea cucumber!

The next stop was the museum. While not grand, it was rich in specimens. There were shells of turtles, and fossils of starfishes and sea cucumbers. Most surprising was the fossil of Megalodon, a prehistoric shark. Holding the giant shark's tooth was a once-in-a-lifetime experience. There were also the preserved bodies of jellyfishes in jars. When quizzed by the guide on what to do if a jellyfish stung someone, students answered with confidence that peeing on the wound was the way to go. We were wrong. In truth, peeing would not help, and you should just get that person to a doctor!

The clock struck twelve when we headed in for lunch at the dining area. Students queued up to collect mouth-watering plates of chicken rice. We chatted excitedly in anticipation of the afternoon's activities.

In the last part of our tour, we were ushered into a lab. In groups, we had to identify the type of plastic polluting the sea by testing its density.

Each group split into two pairs: one pair ventured to the beach to collect plastics while the other tested the density of known compounds of different plastics using different liquids. Once finished, each group nominated a representative to read out their findings.

Photos were taken after, and the students returned to the port. The boat ride back was treated with less enthusiasm, as most of us were so tired, we could have been casted in *The Walking Dead*. After an exhausting but exciting day, our bodies ached, but we wouldn't trade this day for any other.
